We're growing! Because of your support, this year we're starting a new pilot site in Latin America and also bringing select children to the U.S. for surgery.

In 2012, you helped to evaluate 115 children and provide 22 surgeries to children. Also, your support allowed us to focus on creating the non-profit infrastructure necessary prior to expanding services.

So now in 2013, in addition to providing 20-30 surgeries to children in Colombia, your support helps:

- Visit Belize and Costa Rica to assess a new pilot site partnership and treat more children,
- Hold at least one surgical trip to the new pilot site and provide 3-5 surgeries, and
- Bring 1-2 children to Austin, TX for spine surgery.

This year, you will touch over 130 children's lives and provide surgery to 20-35 children.

So, thank you for supporting the vision - that every child with a spinal deformity has the opportunity to have a normal life.

Thank you for transforming the lives of children worldwide and giving hope.





The Hope You Share By Bridget Mortell

We first met tiny Estephania when she was just two and a half years old. She wore a brace that covered her entire torso and she couldn't walk by herself. Her mom helped her take a few steps, but her legs were too weak to support her little body. Immediately the collaborative surgical team, including Drs. Geck, Rinella, Uribe, Gonzalez, Herrera-Soto, and Kuhns, ordered a full range of images including X-rays, MRI, and CT-scans.

They discovered a very rare and unexpected condition. In addition to her prominent scoliosis, Estephania also had an extremely dangerous instability in the two vertebrae closest to her skull (C1 and C2). This instability between spine and skull (body and head) was impacting her ability to walk and, if left untreated, could potentially take her life.

The day after we first met Estephania, we performed her potentially life-saving surgery. Because of her specific condition (C1 was in front of C2), the space available for very delicate and specific nerve groups was drastically reduced. Thus, we carefully provided additional stability to her neck and increased the space her nerves needed to properly function and grow.

With this initial surgery complete, we scheduled surgery to address her scoliosis during our next visit. Six months later Estephania greeted us with a smile, having healed completely from her first surgery and walking much better.

Since Estephania was so young, we treated her scoliosis with growing rods – which help reverse and/or slow her scoliosis while allowing her spine and chest cavity to grow. Once she is fully grown, she will need a full spinal fusion. In the mean time, every six months to a year, we will operate to extend or lengthen her growth rod.

To date, you've helped to provide Estephania with six total surgeries, including one to potentially save her life, one to place her growth rod, and four to let her body continue to grow. Now her scoliosis is no longer visible, she walks without assistance, and she has been known to answer to Dr. Rinella's "dance off" challenges much to our delight.

Estephania just amazes us with her progressive physical change, gentle trust, and most of all her bravery. While the changes to her body are visible, the growth in her confidence and personality shine brighter and brighter. You have given her the opportunity to not only live, but also to physically grow and to thrive. You've forever change her life - and her family's life.

We hope Estephania's story and photos brightened your day and capture your heart - as token of thanks for the hope you've given her.



When great talent is gathered together, you can expect that there will be some fan-fare from time to time. Our dedicated team of surgeons have often been recognized for their talents and accomplishments, and the last few months were no exception. Here are highlights about our co-founders:

In the fall of 2012, our very own Dr. Tony Rinella received the Walter P. Blount Humanitarian Award from the Scoliosis Research Society (SRS), in recognition of his outstanding service for those with spinal deformities.

The Blount Award is a humanitarian award given to an individual who provides outstanding service for those with spinal deformities, and recognizes their generous actions stem from of a sense of service to larger social and professional goals. A plaque was awarded and the recipient's name announced at the SRS Annual Meeting, which was held in Chicago on Sept 8 at the Sheraton Chicago Hotel and Towers.

Dr. Matthew Geck was recognized by Becker's Spine Review as a Spine Surgeon Leader to Know and included his practice, Seton Spine & Scoliosis Center in Austin, Texas as one of the 55 Practices to Know.

In addition, Dr. Geck has been recognized for his work with minimally invasive techniques to correct scoliosis curvatures. Articles on Dr. Geck's accomplishments can be found at http://beckersorthopedicandspine.com.

Further, Dr. Geck presented two research projects at the International Meeting for Advanced Spinal Techniques in Turkey in July 2012: 1. Occipital-Cervical Instability in Morquio-Brailsford's Disease (MPSIV): A cohort of 16 patients treated in the SpineHope/Casa de Colombia global outreach clinic and 2. Posterior, Single Approach, Two or Three Incision Mini Open Correction and Fusion for AIS.
